The first greenhouse was established in St. Davids Ontario, which is located on the southern edge of Niagara-on-the-Lake. We have expanded our greenhouses to currently include Beamsville and Niagara on the Lake Ontario, both located within the Niagara Region. It starts with having a team with over 100-years of combined growing experience. Our growers have trained all over the world and their attention to detail and genuine passion for what they do is seen in the world-class plants they produce. We believe that our carbon footprint should be as close to zero as possible. To achieve this, we grow our vegetables on natural materials and use only biological insects and environmentally friendly products. We also use supplementary insects like bumblebees for pollination.

We began this journey back in 2012 with a lot of passion, drive, commitment, and a big dream. A dream to make the best possible spirits and be honest at every step. It takes an honest day's work in the truest sense to make honest to goodness spirits. We are dedicated to crafting exceptional spirits that embody the rich traditions of distilling while embracing a modern, artisanal approach. Located in the heart of Ontario's Niagara wine region, our distillery is founded on a passion for quality, creativity, and a deep connection to the land.

#### **Little Foot Farms**

All our animals are raised naturally, outdoors, in the fresh air & sunshine. No drugs, hormones or antibiotics are used...we are following organic techniques & principals...always have. Our livestock are pastured here at Little Foot Farm (lamb, goat, poultry) & at Comfort Farms in St Anns (beef, pork, alpaca). We also carefully outsource some items which we have been asked for & cannot produce ourselves (wild caught fish, local farmed venison, organic produce & dairy). Our ethically raised meats are pastured, on grass, fed a mix of non gmo grains (small batch milled by Comforts) & supplemented with fresh daily produce. The fiber part of our store encompasses the same philosophy with natural yarns, fleece, hides & finished products. Alpaca, Pygora, Angora, Shetland....socks, mitts, hats, sweaters, baby items...lots to enjoy!

#### Smithville

Smithville was first settled by Richard Griffin and his family, including his sons Abraham, Edward, Nathaniel, Isaiah, Smith, Jonathan, and Richard Jr., United Empire Loyalists who came from Nine Partners, New York in 1787. Edward "Ned" Griffin is sometimes claimed to be the real founder of the village. He was the one who felled the first tree, chose the village site, cleared the first acre of land, built the first house, and lived his entire life in the village. His brother, Smith Griffin, another of Richard Griffin's sons is credited with building a tread wheel in 1810. Settlers who wanted their grain ground were required to provide their own motive power by putting their oxen on the tread. Later, Smith Griffin built a dam and mill on the Twenty Mile Creek, making the treadmill obsolete. Smith also started an ashery, while Edward opened a general store.

By 1849, Smithville had reached a population of about 150, and had been granted a post office with twice-weekly delivery. The settlement had a grist mill, a saw mill, a carding machine and cloth factory, four stores, one machine shop, one tannery, two blacksmiths, two tailors and two shoemakers.

Smithville first became a police village in 1887, however the arrangement was unsatisfactory and the village again became part of South Grimsby Township in 1889. It was not until 1914 that Smithville was reorganized into a police village on a more permanent basis. By the 1950s, the population had grown to approximately 1,000.

Smithville, along with the remainder of South Grimsby Township was amalgamated into the newly formed Township of West Lincoln on January 1, 1970.

A community in the township of West Lincoln, Niagara Region, Ontario, Canada. The former police village is located on Highway 20 between Hamilton and Niagara Falls. Smithville is the largest population centre and governing centre of the township of West Lincoln.
